Who Medical Eligibility Criteria Wheel for Contraceptive Use
Jul 01 2021 Family planning allows people to attain their desired number of children and determine the spacing of pregnancies. It is achieved through use of contraceptive methods and the treatment of infertility. Promotion of family planning--and ensuring access to preferred contraceptive methods for women and couples--is essential to securing the well-being and autonomy of women, while supporting the health and development of communities. Family planning / contraception is key to slowing unsustainable population growth and the resulting negative global impacts on the economy,

environment, and national and regional development efforts follows therefore that safe contraceptive methods need to be available to as many women as possible, including those who have a pre-existing medical condition. WHO's Medical Eligibility Criteria for Contraceptive Use, which was first published in 1996, provides family planning providers with guidance on helping those living with medical conditions to choose a contraceptive method that works for them. For each medical condition or medically relevant characteristic, contraceptive methods are placed into one of four numbered categories. Category 1. A condition for which there is no restriction for use of the contraceptive method Category 2. A condition where the advantages of using the method generally outweigh the theoretical or proven risks Category 3. A condition where the theoretical or proven risks usually outweigh the advantages of using the method Category 4. A condition which represents an unacceptable health risk if the contraceptive method is used. This simple classification enables family planning providers to provide contraception safely to women (and men) who previously may have been excluded from methods because of a lack of clinical guidance.

Medical Eligibility Criteria for Contraceptive Use 17 2022
Medical Eligibility Criteria for Contraceptive Use reviews the medical eligibility criteria for use of contraception, offering guidance on the safety and use of different methods for women and men with specific characteristics or known medical conditions. The recommendations are based on systematic reviews of available clinical and epidemiological research. It is a companion guideline to Selected Practice Recommendations

for Contraceptive Use. Together, these documents are intended to be used by policy-makers, program managers, and the scientific community to support national programs in the preparation of service delivery guidelines. The fourth edition of this useful resource supersedes previous editions, and has been fully updated and expanded. It includes over 86 new recommendations and 165 updates to recommendations in the previous edition. Guidance for populations with special needs is now provided, and a new annex details evidence on drug interactions from concomitant use of antiretroviral therapy and hormonal contraceptives. Everyone involved in providing family planning services and contraception should have the fourth edition of Medical Eligibility Criteria for Contraceptive Use at hand.

The rest were for companies seeking to join existing projects or to continue participating in existing ATP projects after experiencing a change in their ownership status. The total number of findings does not correspond directly to the number of projects in which U.S. subsidiaries of foreign-owned companies sought participation. There are a few instances in which joint venture projects had more than one foreign-owned company seeking participation. Also note that the total number of findings does not correspond directly to the number of foreign-owned companies currently participating in projects for a variety of reasons. Some findings, for example, were determined to be positive, but for other reasons the foreign-owned company never participated in the project. Of the first one foreign eligibility findings carried out through 1997, only two were negative. Both of these findings were for Japanese-owned firms, and they did not pass on the basis of the national policies of Japan rather than any shortcomings of the companies themselves. Of the total 352 projects in ATP's portfolio, twenty-nine active and completed projects involve thirty-three participants who are U.S. subsidiaries of foreign-owned companies. They are participating in 18 out of a total of 119 joint venture projects and 11 out of a total of 233 single-company projects. These participants represent twenty-one distinct foreign-owned companies from twelve different countries. A few of these companies are participating in more than one project. Highway Contracting Aug 22 2020 Pursuant to a congressional request, GAO reviewed whether federal guidance and oversight engender effective and consistent state application of the eligibility standards governing the Department of Transportation's (DOT) Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program. GAO found that: (1) ineffective federal guidance hindered state ability to consistently apply the eligibility criteria for the program; (2) DOT and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) have issued confusing and conflicting eligibility guidance; (3) DOT does not use a systematic approach for providing guidance; (4) there is no clearly designated lead office, uniform order or instruction, or procedure to develop, update, and coordinate the distribution of eligibility guidance to the states; (5) DOT and FHWA offices do not effectively coordinate their efforts to provide eligibility

guidance and as a result the same firm could be certified as eligible in one state but denied eligibility in another; (6) DOT is revising the regulation governing the program to clarify eligibility guidance, but the revisions have been under way since 1988 and DOT did not meet a 1991 deadline; (7) FHWA is responsible for overseeing states' interpretation of the program but it has not established a system to evaluate whether states correctly and uniformly apply eligibility criteria; and (8) FHWA requires its field offices to oversee state agencies' eligibility criteria, but the offices examined eligibility decisions in only 10 state agencies between 1988 and 1991.
